PPA PREPARES FOR OVER 1.7M EXPECTED PORT PASSENGERS FOR HOLY WEEK

MANILA – The Philippine Ports Authority (PPA) is expecting the number of port passengers for this year's Holy Week to reach over 1.73 million from April 14 to 20.

In a statement on Tuesday, PPA General Manager Jay Santiago said the expected total this year is a 3.5 percent increase from the

1.67 million passengers during the same period last year.

"We are prepared for the increased number of passengers this Holy Week 2025, especially as the Lenten season coincides with summer. Most of our local travelers are really taking advantage of this long days of day-off and for some tourists, it is also a great time to explore our islands via sea travel," he said.

To accommodate the increased number of passengers, Santiago ordered the deployment of additional personnel and enhanced terminal operations in key ports.

"Measures include optimizing passenger terminal facilities, ensuring the functionality of security and safety equipment, and deploying port police for crowd control and assistance," he said.

In addition, the PPA has conducted maintenance checks on critical infrastructure in preparation for the expected surge in travelers.

"With the adequate manpower, appropriate facilities, and back-up systems placed in ports, we can assure the public that we are ready for the influx but then again, it is the peak season so we appeal to our passengers to book their tickets ahead of time and allot extra hours for travel going to the ports."

To further assist commuters, help desks have been placed in major ports nationwide to provide immediate information and to address concerns of travelers to the port police or Philippine Coast Guard personnel.

According to PPA data, the top five ports this Lenten season will be Port Management Office (PMO) Batangas, PMO Mindoro, PMO Panay/Guimaras, PMO Negros Oriental/Siquijor, and PMO Bohol.

In the first three weeks of March, passenger numbers have reached 3,027,881, averaging 1,009,294 passengers per week. **(PNA) By Raymond Carl Dela Cruz**

PGH TO SERVE MORE FILIPINOS WITH INCREASED MANPOWER – PALACE

MANILA – The Philippine General Hospital (PGH) is set to improve its medical services and serve more Filipinos with the addition of more personnel, Malacañang said Tuesday.

PGH, the country's premiere government hospital, is set to receive a major staffing boost with 1,200 additional positions approved by the Department of Budget and Management.

The move, according to Palace Press Officer Claire Castro, is the government's response to the PGH's request to enhance its organizational and manpower capacity in order to deliver quality and affordable healthcare services.

"Alam naman po natin na napakarami pong mga Pilipino ang talagang

pumupunta sa PGH dahil po ito'y nakakapagbigay ng magandang serbisyo at maaari pong napakaliit na kanilang babayaran kapag po sila ay pumunta sa PGH (We know that many Filipinos actually go to PGH because it provides good and affordable services)," Castro said, emphasizing the hospital's crucial role in providing accessible healthcare.

She explained that the decision to expand the hospital's staff was made to improve patient care and ensure quicker medical attention for those seeking treatment.

The creation of additional positions will be pursued in four tranches, starting in the first quarter of 2025, the fourth quarter of 2025, and in 2026 and 2027. **(PNA) By Darryl John Esguerra**

CALABARZON POLICE ARREST ALLEGED GUN RUNNER IN BACOR CAVITE

Camp BGen Vicente P Lim – A joint operation led by personnel of the Regional Intelligence Division 4A Special Team, with support from the Technical Support Company, Regional Mobile Force Battalion 4A, and Bacoor Component City Police Station, conducted a buy-bust operation against loose firearms, resulting in the arrest of an alleged gun runner on April 7, 2025, in Brgy. Molino 2, Bacoor City. The suspect was identified as alias "Jay," 52, of Brgy. Molino 2, Bacoor City, Cavite.

During the operation, police officers utilizing an Alternative Recording Device (ARD), seized several pieces of evidence, including high-powered firearms and live ammunition. The confiscated items were as follows:

1. One (1) KG9 long firearm
2. Three (3) KG9 long firearms
3. Two (2) AR15 long firearms
4. One (1) caliber .45 pistol
5. One (1) caliber .22 pistol
6. Six (6) 9mm long double magazines
7. One (1) lower frame of a caliber .45 pistol
8. Three (3) caliber .45 magazines

9. One (1) box of caliber .45 live ammunition
10. One (1) ziplock plastic bag of 9mm live ammunition
PBGEN Paul Kenneth T. Lucas, Regional Director of PRO CALABARZON, commended the joint operatives for the successful police operation against loose firearms especially during the election period. He also reminds the public to remain vigilant and report any suspicious activity to local authorities.

"PRO 4A remains committed to ridding the streets of illegal firearms and ammunition. Meanwhile, the arrested suspect is under the custody of Bacoor CCPS, where he will face charges for violating Republic Act No. 10591 (Comprehensive Firearms and Ammunition Regulation Act) and the Omnibus Election Code's Gun Ban provisions. **(RPIO4A)**

ILLEGAL DRUGS WORTH 102K CONFISCATED IN BACOR

Camp BGen Pantaleon Garcia, City of Imus, Cavite — In a significant blow to the local drug trade, operatives of the Bacoor Component City Police Station Drug Enforcement Unit successfully apprehended three street-level drug personalities during a buy-bust operation conducted at around 11:00 PM on April 7, 2025, in Sorrento, Barangay Panapaan 4, Bacoor City, Cavite.

PLTCOL JOHN PAOLO V CARRACEDO, COP, BACOR CCPS, identified the three (3) suspects as alias "Jokjok" and alias "HAJIE", both resident of B15 L48 Viola Street, Sorrento, Brgy. Panapaan 4, Bacoor City; and alias "JAYSON", and a resident of B9 L20, Brgy. Panapaan 4, Bacoor City.

The operation, in coordination with PDEA, led to the confiscation of the following items: Four (4) heat-sealed transparent plastic sachets containing a white crystalline substance suspected to be shabu, with an estimated total weight of 15 grams and a Standard Drug Price of approximately Php 102,000.00.

All suspects are currently under police custody and will be facing charges for violation of Republic Act 9165, otherwise known as the Comprehensive Dangerous Drugs Act of 2002.

PCol Alegre expressed his gratitude to the City Drug Enforcement team of the Bacoor Component City Police Station for their prompt and decisive action to combat illegal drug activities in Cavite.

"I want to commend our drug operations team for successfully apprehending the high-value individuals engaged in illicit drug activities. Let us keep collaborating closely to eradicate the dangers presented by illegal drugs and to capture everyone engaged in the illicit drug trade", he added.

The arrest was made by virtue of a warrant of arrest for the crime of Statutory Rape with Criminal Case number CRM-2025-119. The Warrant of Arrest issued and signed by Hon. Niven Redillas Canlapan, Presiding Judge, Regional Trial Court, Carmona City, Cavite, dated March 24, 2025 with no recommended

bail.

The accused is currently detained at the Custodial Facility of Carmona CCPS.

CAVITE GOV'T BRINGS FREE MEDICAL SERVICES TO COMMUNITIES

According to the Cavite Provincial Information Office, 196 individuals received free medical consultations, while 107 people took advantage of dental check-ups and tooth extractions.

Meanwhile, in observance of World Tuberculosis Day, Barangay Tua in Magallanes served as the latest venue for the Department of Health's (DOH) PuroKalusugan services. A total of 137 residents benefited from various services offered by the PuroKalusugan initiative, such as chest X-ray screenings, HIV testing and counseling, and prenatal check-ups.

LAGUNA TOWN ENHANCES CHILDCARE SERVICES

LOS BAÑOS, Laguna (PIA) — In a bid to support solo parents and their children, the local government of Los Baños, Laguna continues to provide safe and inclusive spaces for children through its newly-improved Child Care Center. This Child Care Center is designed as a safe and nurturing space where parents can leave their children while they attend to their everyday responsibilities. It offers a child-friendly environment equipped with play areas, learning materials, and professional caregivers, ensuring the holistic well-being of the children.

"Parents who wish to enroll their children in the Child Care Center can do so through the Municipal Social Welfare

and Development (MSWD) office. Upon registration, they are required to specify the duration of their child's stay. The center operates from 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM, aligning with the typical work hours of parents to accommodate their schedules," municipal information officer John Marvin Canaria said in a statement.

The LB government reveals the modern amenities in the center include designated play areas equipped with child-safe playground structures, shade canopies, a nap room, and dedicated seating for guardians. The educational and recreational center also offers storytelling sessions, arts and crafts activities, and early childhood development programs. To ensure the highest level

of care and supervision, the personnel at the Child Care Center underwent a careful selection process. Caregivers must be registered nurses, while teachers are not strictly required to have an education degree, as long as they have completed a four-year college course. Moreso, the facility will help solo parents by offering parenting workshops, job placement programs, and mental health support services, ensuring they have the necessary resources to balance work and childcare effectively. "It is one of the programs he really did for solo parents? Because, aside from the subsidies that they get from the government, this is one of the things that can really help our solo parents in different ways," Canaria stated. Unlike traditional daycare

centers, the Los Baños Child Care Center provides a more spacious environment where children can play freely. On April 3, President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr. witnessed the ceremonial signing of the Joint Circular on the Establishment of Child Development Centers (CDCs) between the Department of Education (DepEd) and the Department of Budget and Management (DBM). DOLE: LOWER UNEMPLOYMENT FRUIT OF ROBUST GOV'T, LGUS PARTNERSHIP

MANILA – The strong partnership between the government and local government units (LGUs) in providing job opportunities led to the improvement in employment figures, the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) said Tuesday.

“In our unwavering commitment to promoting employment and livelihood opportunities for all and following the President's directive to boost the conduct of job fairs across the country, the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE), in partnership with the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), Department of Agriculture (DA), and Department of Health (DOH), is actively spearheading the “Trabaho sa Bagong Pilipinas” and has evolved into “Trabaho at Serbisyon Pangkalusugan sa Bagong Pilipinas” which effectively converge national government initiatives with LGU participation through the Public Employment Service Offices (PESO) and serving a wide array of individuals,” Labor Secretary Bienvenido Laguesma in a statement. The Philippine Statistics Authority said preliminary results of the latest Labor Force Survey (LFS) showed that the unemployment rate further declined to 3.8 percent in February this year from 4.3 percent the previous month.

It was the lowest rate since the 3.1 percent recorded in December last year.

It also said the number of unemployed Filipinos declined to 1.94 million from 2.16 million in January this year. “Through targeted job fairs, we are directly connecting those graduating from the Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program (4Ps) with meaningful employment prospects. This collaborative endeavor mirrors our dedication to

empowering our groups in vulnerable situations towards self-sufficiency and a stable future,” Laguesma added. He, meanwhile, said the DOLE is now preparing for the holding of the annual Labor Day job fairs.

“In direct response to the President's resolute call for poverty reduction and inclusive growth, the Department will once again be conducting our annual Labor Day Job Fair with a theme ‘Manggagawang Pilipino, Kaagapay sa Pag-unlad, Sandigan ng Mas Matatag na Bagong Pilipinas’. This vital initiative in partnership with the private sector will bring thousands of local and overseas job opportunities directly to our Filipino jobseekers, reaffirming our dedication to connecting available talent with opportunities in the labor market,” he said.

He added that the DOLE is also bolstering its efforts to empower the youth through various programs such as the JobStart Program, Special Program for Employment of Students, and Government Internship Program.

The labor chief also noted the February 2025 LFS manifested the government's firm commitment to creating more jobs as it maintained a positive outlook and an encouraging trajectory for the local labor market.

He noted that the robust services sector continues to remain a primary driver of job creation, contributing 61.6 percent to total employment.

“We are equally encouraged by the significant employment growth witnessed in both our agriculture and industry sectors. This balanced growth across key economic pillars strengthens the resilience and diversity of our employment and livelihood landscape,” Laguesma said.

BATANGAS BLOOD COUNCIL LAUDED FOR SUPPORT TO NAT'L BLOOD DONATION PROGRAM

BATANGAS CITY (PIA) — The Department of Health (DOH) Calabarzon has commended the Batangas Provincial Blood Council for its contributions to the National Voluntary Blood Services Program.

Recognizing the province's consistent efforts in promoting safe and sufficient blood supply, the regional health office highlighted Batangas' remarkable blood collection performance, which reached 170.2 percent in 2024 — a notable rise from 137 percent in 2023.

According to DOH Calabarzon, the council has played a vital role in blood donation

advocacy, benefiting not only Batangas but the entire Calabarzon Region. The World Health Organization recommends that blood collection must reach at least 1 percent of a population to meet regional needs — a benchmark that Batangas has far exceeded.

Composed of various government agencies, local offices, and institutions from the health and academic sectors, the Batangas Provincial Blood Council has been instrumental in mobilizing support across the province.

Several local government units (LGUs) were also recognized for their strong backing of the blood donation drive. The Red Category Award, granted to LGUs that met the 1 percent target, was awarded to the municipalities of San Nicolas, Malvar, Balayan, and Nasugbu.

The Bronze Category Award, for LGUs that exceeded the 1 percent requirement, was conferred on the cities of Sto. Tomas, Lipa, Calaca, and Tanauan, along with the towns of Calatagan, Taysan, and Mabini.

Meanwhile, Batangas City and Cuenca received the Silver Category Award, while Alitagtag emerged as the top-performing LGU, earning the Gold Award for its exceptional performance in the blood services program.

Special recognition was also given to the town of Tingloy under Project ISLA (Inter-Island Save Lives Assistance) — an initiative dedicated to sustaining mobile blood donation activities in island municipalities. **(MPDC, PIA Batangas)**

DFA: 1 FILIPINO CONFIRMED DEAD IN MYANMAR QUAKE

MANILA – The Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA) on Wednesday confirmed the death of one Filipino in Myanmar following the 7.7 magnitude earthquake that struck the Southeast Asian country last month.

DFA Undersecretary Eduardo Jose de Vega, in a statement, said the remains of one of the four missing Filipinos "have been positively identified" in Myanmar's central city of Mandalay.

"The family of the deceased Filipino has been so informed. Out of respect for their privacy in this time of grief, we are withholding further information on the matter," he said.

The Philippine government, he said, continues to work and hopes for the best for the remaining three Filipinos who are still unaccounted in the city.

Alvin Aragon initially confirmed on Wednesday morning that the body of his brother Francis, one of the four missing Filipinos, has been found.

"Ipinapaalam po [naming] na nakita na po [yong] kapatid namin at masakit

man sa amin tangapin [kasama na siya] ni Lord ngayon (We would like to inform that our brother has been found and while it hurts to accept, he is now with the Lord)," he wrote on a Facebook post.

"We are currently mourning and grieving for the [loss] of our youngest brother... we thank God for all the grace, comfort, encouragement and strength He has given this past weeks sa aming (to our) family," he added.

De Vega on Tuesday said a team from the National Bureau of Investigation is helping in the identification of remains in Mandalay and had been checking DNA samples taken from remains with those provided by the next of kin.

The violent magnitude 7.7 tremor hit Sagaing in central Myanmar last March 28, devastating the country and neighboring Thailand.

More than a week after the powerful tremors, a United Nations situational report said death toll has risen to over 3,500 while more than 200 remain missing nationwide. **(PNA) By Joyce Ann L. Rocamora**

PH, US TROOPS BEEF UP INTEROPERABILITY WITH WARFIGHTING DRILLS

MANILA – Participants of the "Salaknib" exercises from the Philippine Army (PA) and the US Army Pacific (USARPAC) have conducted a series of drills that would increase interoperability between Filipino and American military units.

Army spokesperson Col. Louie Dema-ala, in a media statement Wednesday, said these drills, under the first phase of the exercises, include radio communication, field artillery live fire, sling load operations using helicopters, and medical evacuation.

He added that these "subject matter expert exchanges" (SMEEs), crucial in warfighting functions, took place in Fort Magsaysay in Nueva Ecija.

Dema-ala also said PA and USARPAC signalers have

trained to familiarize and operate each other's radio equipment. Participating Filipino and American units constructed an antenna in two separate locations to establish a line of communication between both systems.

On the field artillery live-fire training, Dema-ala said PA and USARPAC cannoneers exchanged tactics, techniques, and procedures, deepening their understanding of each other's operational approaches.

"The said training simulated the integration of both forces to enhance the overall effectiveness of ground operations, providing critical fire support to infantry and armored units," he added. PA and USARPAC troops likewise conducted sling load operations to improve their skills in airlift and

DSWD ENJOINS COMMUNITIES TO STRENGTHEN PROTECTION FOR ELDERLY

MANILA – The Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) on Wednesday appealed for stronger community structures to protect the elderly following the recent incident in Antipolo, Rizal where an elderly person with disability was mocked by four men.

"Let this incident be a reminder to all that our senior citizens have rights that are protected by the State. Hindi pwede yung bibiru-biruin at parang pinaglaruan sila porke hindi na sila malakas physically para umangal (It is unacceptable for them to be made fun of or mocked just because they cannot defend themselves anymore)," Assistant Secretary Irene Dumlao said in a news release.

Dumlao encouraged local government units (LGUs) to replicate the agency's Reporting System and Prevention Program for Elderly Abuse Cases (ReSPPEC) to safeguard the elderly and address cases of abuse.

The ReSPPEC is a community-based program that aims to protect the rights and safety of older persons by strengthening partnerships and networks among the senior citizens' sector, stakeholders, and LGUs.

Although not prevalent, there are reported situations wherein older persons suffer greatly

either from family members or from strangers, Dumlao said.

Under the ReSPPEC, a holistic system is put into place at the community level, which provides for the reporting, investigating, intervening, and monitoring of the elderly, especially in cases of abuse.

Dumlao said ReSPPEC was pilot-tested in San Carlos, Pangasinan; Lambunao, Iloilo; Maco, Davao de Oro; and Valenzuela City, the National Capital Region.

The pilot areas established a Protective Committee for Senior Citizens and an Elderly Help Desk.

Other components of the program include the creation of a referral network for services, the development of a reporting mechanism for elder abuse; the conduct of an elder abuse awareness advocacy program; and capability building of stakeholders.

Dumlao said the DSWD is willing to provide guidance and technical assistance to the LGUs wanting to replicate the ReSPPEC in their communities to prevent abuse of the elderly and provide adequate interventions to those at risk.

"We need to give due respect to the elderly and prevent the Rizal incident from happening again," she said. **(PNA)**

ROMUALDEZ HONORS 'UNBREAKABLE' COURAGE OF FILIPINO WAR HEROES

2 NABBED FOR ILLEGAL SALE OF AGRI-CHEMICAL INPUTS IN ISABELA

MANILA – Police arrested two suspects involved in the unauthorized sale of agricultural chemical products intended for free distribution to farmer beneficiaries in Isabela province.

In a statement on Wednesday, Philippine National Police - Criminal Investigation and Detection Group (PNP-CIDG) Director, Maj. Gen. Nicolas Torre III, said the suspects, with aliases Rowena and Dennis, were arrested by members of CIDG-Isabela and the Department of Agriculture (DA) 2 (Cagayan Valley) in a buy-bust in Barangay San Fermin, Cauayan City on April 5.

Seized from the suspects were 43 sacks of DA-marked agricultural chemical inputs worth PHP1.75 million and a white L300 van used for transporting the items.

The DA distributes these products to farmers to protect crops from pests and enhance crop yields,

aimed at increasing their productivity.

The operation stemmed from reports that reached the DA-2 that these products were being sold by unscrupulous individuals.

These products, labeled "Not For Sale," are supposed to be given for free to farmer-beneficiaries under the government's agricultural support program.

The suspects were charged before the National Prosecution Service with violations of Section 8 of Presidential Decree 1144 (Fertilizer and Pesticide Authority) for selling agricultural chemicals without license from the Fertilizer and Pesticide Authority; and Republic Act 7394, or the Consumer Act of the Philippines, for the unlawful sale, distribution, and possession of government-provided agricultural products. **(PNA)**

DILG TO LAUNCH INFRA AUDIT TOOL TO ASSESS BUILDINGS' QUAKE RESILIENCE

MANILA – The Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) is set to launch an infrastructure audit tool to assess the structural integrity of buildings in preparation for a massive earthquake, called the "Big One," in the metropolis and nearby areas.

DILG Undersecretary for Local Government Marlo Iringan, in a news release Wednesday, said the Harmonized Infrastructure Audit tool would be used to ensure the resilience of buildings in the country against earthquakes.

He said the tool, which would help local government units (LGUs) identify the priority structures for infrastructure audits, will be pilot-tested in the National Capital Region, Central Luzon, and Calabarzon.

He said the DILG also partnered with the academe to tap 4th- and 5th-year engineering students to help assess the infrastructures.

"This tool will establish a national standard for assessing local public infrastructures, particularly

their vulnerability to high-magnitude earthquakes," Iringan said as he represented Interior Secretary Jonvic Remulla during the 2nd Earthquake Preparedness Summit organized by the Office of Civil Defense in Quezon City on Tuesday.

During the event, the DILG also discussed its programs to enhance LGU earthquake preparedness and resilience, such as Operation L!sto and the Basic Disaster Risk Reduction and Climate Change Adaptation for barangays.

The DILG secretary sits as the vice chairperson for disaster preparedness of the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council.

According to the Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology, about 3,200 structures are along the West Valley Fault, while 12 percent to 13 percent of residential buildings are forecast to sustain heavy damage when the "Big One" strikes. **(PNA) By Christopher Lloyd Caliwan**

LARGE NPA ARMS CACHE SEIZED IN CAMARINES NORTE

MANILA – The Tanay-headquartered 2nd Infantry Division (2ID) of the Philippine Army on Thursday announced that its troops had seized a large New People's Army (NPA) arms cache in Labo town, Camarines Norte late Wednesday.

In a media statement on Thursday, 2ID spokesperson Lt. Col. Jeffrex Molina said soldiers from the 16th Infantry Battalion under the 201st Infantry Brigade, managed to seize the NPA arms cache in Barangay Exciba with the help of a former rebel.

"The discovered cache contains one Ultimex light machine gun, one M-653 rifle, one M-14 rifle, seven M-16 A1 rifles, 14 magazines, 16 hand grenades, two rolls of detonating cord,

4,211 rounds of 5.56mm live ammunition, and 715 rounds of 7.62mm live ammunition," he said.

Molina also said the local police helped with the operation.

Meanwhile, 2ID commander Maj. Gen. Cerilo Balaoro Jr. said the seizure shows that the cooperation between government forces, former rebels and the local community is working very well.

"The continued recoveries of the terrorists' war items are steadily weakening the operational capability of the terrorist NPA in Southern Luzon," he added.

It can be recalled that dozens of NPA war materiel were recovered in the same barangay last Jan. 9, and in Barangays Baay on Feb. 13 and Malatap on March 9. **(PNA) By Priam Nepomuceno**

BJMP FETES 4 OFFICERS IN FOILED EXTRACTION OF CHINESE SYNDICATE BOSS

MANILA – The Bureau of Jail Management and Penology (BJMP) has recognized four personnel who foiled the attempt of six suspects to snatch an alleged Chinese criminal syndicate leader in Parañaque City.

BJMP Chief, Jail Director Ruel Rivera, awarded the Medalya ng Sugatang Magiting at Medalya ng Kagalingan on Wednesday to the four jail officers who prevented armed men from snatching Hu Yang inside the bureau's vehicle as it traversed a service road of the Cavite Expressway (Cavite) on April 7, according to a news release on Thursday.

The incident occurred while Hu was being transported back to his detention facility after attending a hearing at the Makati Regional Trial Court.

The suspects fired upon the BJMP transport vehicle, prompting the jail personnel to retaliate and forcing the armed men to retreat.

Hu was brought back to the jail facility. "Ang kanilang mabilis at mahusay na tugon

ay sumasalamin ng kanilang katapangan, propesyonalismo, at tunay na serbisyo-publiko (Their quick and prompt response reflects their courage, professionalism, and genuine public service)," Rivera said.

One of the fleeing vehicles collided with a tree and the suspects fled on foot toward the mangrove forest at the Las Piñas-Parañaque Wetland Park, where six of them were arrested with the assistance of the Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) forces.

Arrested were Filipinos James Bales Lasam, 28; Jerom Pascua Salvador, 31; Jerry Calino Escalde, 30; and John Paul Chua, 51; and Chinese nationals Yang Yang Shin and Wang Hongjie.

Recovered from the suspects were a replica grenade, several US dollar bills, a .357 Magnum revolver containing live ammunition, one fired cartridge case, and suspected illegal drugs and drug-related paraphernalia. Jail Officer 2 Leif Joseph Talanquines sustained a

SAPIEA GO OFF TO US FOR TARIFF NEGOTIATIONS, EYES FTA

MANILA – Special Assistant to the President for Investment and Economic Affairs (SAPIEA) Frederick Go will be going to the United States (US) to negotiate the 17-percent tariff imposed by the Trump administration on certain Philippine goods entering the American market.

Speaking to Palace reporters, Go said the Philippine government had received a "positive response" from the US Trade Representative (USTR) on its request for a dialogue to discuss the new tariff.

"We have reached out to the USTR and we have communicated with them our desire to engage in a meeting or dialogue with them and they have positively responded. So, I will be scheduling a trip to the United States to meet with the USTR soon," Go said.

Go said President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr. met with the country's economic managers on Tuesday to discuss the US' reciprocal tariffs and its effects on exports of countries, especially Asian countries, slapped with new tariff rates.

He said Marcos and the economic team also weighed up the risks and the next move, considering that there are industries in the Philippines that would be affected by the US' reciprocal tariff policy.

"The keywords are probably not appeal. This is a negotiation. And of course, in my opinion the best possible outcome is a free trade agreement.

Free trade agreement means zero tariffs on their side, zero tariffs on our side. That's probably the

best possible outcome of that meeting. But again, it's open communication, dialogue, cooperation and let's see what we can negotiate," Go said.

Go acknowledged that Washington D.C.'s latest move may have a "0.1 percent effect" on the country's gross domestic product in the next two years, based on the National Economic and Development Authority estimates.

He, however, said the Philippines still has an "advantage" because of the lower tariff imposed compared to tariff rates set for other countries.

"I think there are two things that we have to do now. Clearly, one is to engage with our exports to discuss with them what are the possible measures that they can take and that the government can assist them in this current situation. That's the first thing. That's the most important thing," Go said.

"Secondly, we have to monitor kung among ginagawa ng mga ibang neighbors po natin 'no, ano iyong mga reaction nila dito sa taripa at ano po ang reaksiyon din ng Estados Unidos sa kanilang mga request (what are our other neighbors are doing, what are their reactions to this tariff and what is the United States' reaction to their requests)," he added.

KANLAON ASHFALL ALERT UP, CLASSES SUSPENDED IN NEGROS OCCIDENTAL

BACOLOD CITY — Some local government units (LGUs) in Negros Occidental urged residents to wear masks and declared the suspension of classes as ashfall hit various areas after another explosive eruption of Mt. Kanlaon on Tuesday morning.

The explosive eruption started at 5:51 a.m. and lasted for 56 minutes, according to the report of the Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology.

It came four months after a similar event took place on Dec. 9, affecting thousands of residents in central and southern Negros, with about 5,600 individuals still staying in evacuation centers as Alert Level 3 remains hoisted over the volcano.

In La Carlota City, ashfall mainly affected the villages of Ara-al, Yubo, San Miguel, Haguimit, La Granja, Cubay, Nagasi, Balabag, and Roberto S. Benedicto, based on the report of the city government. Light ashfall was felt in the Poblacion barangays, it added.

In a statement, Mayor Rex Jalandon said he ordered the suspension of face-to-face classes at all levels in both public and private schools until further notice.

Work is also suspended in all government offices located within the city except for offices and agencies involved in disaster and emergency response.

"Authorities reiterate the strict prohibition of human activity within the six-kilometer permanent danger zone due to the risk of further volcanic activity," he said.

In its advisory, the city government said affected barangays need drinking water and face masks as it urged residents to "remain indoors, stay updated through official channels, and follow all safety advisories issued by local authorities."

The Bureau of Fire Protection is conducting road flushing in affected

barangays and will provide potable water to residents in Barangay Ara-al, it added.

Initial report of the Office of Civil Defense indicated that ashfall was also felt in Barangay Sag-ang, La Castellana and Barangay Ilijan, Bago City.

In La Castellana, Mayor Rhummyla Nicor-Mangilimutan also declared the suspension of classes in all levels until further notice.

The LGU's Incident Management Team also strictly prohibited any entry to the six-kilometer permanent danger zone.

"The window time for evacuees to visit their farms is suspended for the safety of everyone," it said. In Pontevedra, the Municipal Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office also announced the suspension of classes.

Personnel of the Bureau of Fire Protection conducted flushing operations in areas affected by the ashfall while the municipal government distributed face masks in public markets, government offices, and schools.

In Himamaylan City, Mayor Rogelio Raymund Tongson Jr. told residents to wear masks when going outdoors and limit outdoor activities, especially for children, senior citizens, and those with respiratory conditions, after hazy conditions have been observed across the city.

"Report any health concerns to your nearest health center. This is a precautionary measure to protect your health and well-being," the mayor said. In San Carlos City, all activities within the 8-km. radius of the volcano summit have been suspended due to the possibility of alert escalation.

"Barangays near the affected areas are enjoined to constantly monitor and must preposition all community warning, evacuation and response assets," the City Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office said in its advisory. **(PNA) By Nanette Guadaluver**

PALACE: MISOGYNIST CANDIDATES SHOULD NO LONGER BE ADMIRER

MANILA — Malacañang on Thursday condemned misogynistic and degrading remarks made by certain election candidates, particularly at the local level, emphasizing that such behavior should no longer be admired or tolerated by the public.

In a press briefing, Palace Press Officer Claire Castro expressed concern over how past political narratives often celebrated disrespectful statements, especially those targeting women.

Castro questioned why candidates or public figures who made offensive remarks were often cheered on in the past despite the degrading nature of their statements.

"Paano nga ba ang mga ganitong klaseng pananalita noon ay ipinapalakpakan? Parang ipinagbubunyi ang mga kandidato o mga lider na nagsasalita ng walang karespe-respeto lalong-lalo na sa mga kababaihan (How could these kinds of statements be applauded before? It's as if candidates or leaders who speak disrespectfully, especially to women, are being celebrated)," Castro said.

"Ipinagmamalaki, p i n a g t a t a w a n a n , ginagawang joke ang pambababae ng mga kalalakihan. Ginagawa ring issue at katawanaan ang mga rape na sitwasyon (Womanizing is celebrated, ridiculed, and made into a joke. Rape situations are also made into a joke)."

Recently, a Pasig congressional candidate became controversial for brazenly inviting single mothers to "sleep with

him," while a gubernatorial candidate in Mindanao claimed that only "beautiful women" deserved nursing scholarships.

Castro said such behavior — which trivializes serious issues like women's rights and sexual violence—should no longer be accepted.

"Hindi na po ito dapat na gawing idolo ang mga ganitong klaseng ng mga tao. Hindi na ito dapat pamarisan. Hindi na ito dapat pinapalakpakan (These kinds of people should no longer be idolized. They should no longer be followed as examples. They should no longer be applauded)," the Palace official said.

Castro made it clear that unlike in the past, such narratives no longer have a place under President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr.

"Kung nagawa ito dati at pinapalakpakan, hindi na po sa panahon ng administrasyon ni Pangulong Marcos na dapat itong manyari (If this was done before and was applauded, not anymore under the administration of President Marcos)," she said.

Castro said Marcos is pleased with the response of the Commission on Elections (Comelec), which recently called out the concerned candidates and asked them to explain their misogynistic and degrading remarks during their campaigns.

The Palace also appealed to candidates to elevate the level of discourse and keep their campaigns free of offensive statements. **(PNA) By Darryl John Esguerra**

MARCOS: LESSONS OF PAST MUST GUIDE THE FUTURE

MANILA — President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr. led the commemoration of the 83rd Day of Valor (Araw ng Kagitingan) at the Mt. Samat National Shrine in Pilar, Bataan on Wednesday, urging the nation to learn from the lessons of the past and apply them to build a brighter future.

OUT-PATIENT EMERGENCY CASES NOW COVERED BY PHILHEALTH – PALACE

MANILA — The Philippine Health Insurance Corp. (PhilHealth) will now pay for emergency procedures and other services for patients who do not need to be confined in hospitals, according to Malacañang. This as the state insurer introduced the Outpatient Emergency Care Benefit (OECB) package, expanding its coverage to include outpatient emergency services and providing immediate financial assistance and

healthcare support to its members.

In a press briefing Thursday, Palace Press Officer Claire Castro said the OECB, which took effect last Feb. 14, covers various emergency cases common health issues like dizziness and diarrhea. "Ito'y package sa lahat ng mga PhilHealth-accredited hospitals mula Level 1 hanggang Level 3 simula pa noong Feb. 14, 2025," she said.

Castro highlighted that

this initiative is in line with President Ferdinand Marcos Jr.'s directive to enhance and expand the benefits available to Filipinos through PhilHealth.

She pointed out that, according to the latest advisory from PhilHealth, separate accreditation for the OECB is no longer required, as it is now automatically included in the accreditation process for all PhilHealth facilities.

"Ayong sa PhilHealth

Advisory No. 2025-0009, hindi na kailangan ng mga hiwalay na accreditation para sa OECB dahil bahagi na ito ng pagsusuri sa mga PhilHealth facilities noong sila ay na-accredited," Castro said.

PH GROSS INT'L RESERVES AT \$106.2-B AS OF END-MARCH

MANILA – The Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP) said preliminary data showed that the country's gross international reserves (GIR) settled at USD106.2 billion as of end-March this year.

Data released late Monday showed that the GIR level during the month was slightly lower than the USD107.4 billion recorded in February this year.

International reserves, also referred to as GIR, are foreign assets of the BSP held mostly as investments in foreign-issued securities, monetary gold, and foreign exchange.

"The month-on-month decrease in the GIR level reflected mainly the drawdowns by the national government on its foreign currency deposits with the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas to meet its external debt obligations and BSP's net foreign exchange operations," said the BSP.

The BSP said net international reserves or the difference between the BSP's reserve assets (GIR) and reserve liabilities (short-term foreign debt and credit and loans from the International Monetary Fund), also decreased to USD106.2 billion from USD107.4 billion in February.

Despite the decline, the BSP said the latest GIR provides a robust external liquidity buffer, equivalent to 7.3 months' worth of imports of goods and payments of services and primary income.

It also covers about 3.7 times the country's short-term external debt based on residual maturity.

By convention, GIR is viewed to be adequate if it can finance at least three months' worth of the country's imports of goods and payments of services and primary income. **(PNA) By Anna Leah Gonzales**

MANILA – Government-owned and controlled corporations (GOCCs) Philippine Pharma Procurement, Inc. (PPPI) and Clark International Airport Corp. (CIAC) are eyeing for investors for their joint project, a pharmaceutical logistics and distribution center, in Clark Freeport Zone.

PPPI President Maria Bianca Kim Lokin told the Philippine News Agency Tuesday that development of the pharmaceutical hub will require an initial investment of around PHP2 billion.

"PPPI Pharma Hub will need an initial investment of about USD35.25 million (PHP2 billion) for development. Total area being earmarked is 15 hectares, with an initial development for five to 10 hectares," she said. "We will also explore investment options, joint ventures and public private partnerships."

On Monday, PPPI and CIAC signed a memorandum of

understanding (MOU) to develop a pharmaceutical logistics hub within the Clark Aviation Capital.

Under the MOU, CIAC will be providing the viable land for the project while PPPI will identify operational requirements, including warehousing, cold chain requirements, and air freight handling capabilities needed for the proposed logistics and distribution hub.

CIAC President Jojit Alcazar, in statement Monday, said that since "Clark hosts global cargo leaders FedEx, UPS, and DHL" the team-up with the country's sole government-run pharmaceutical company "further positions CIAC to be the premier global civil aviation logistics hub of the Philippines."

He said the project aligns with the Marcos administration's eight-point agenda on providing Filipinos affordable and accessible healthcare for all. **(PNA) By Kris Crismundo**

BTR FULLY AWARDS REISSUED TREASURY BOND

MANILA – The Bureau of the Treasury (BTr) fully awarded on Tuesday the reissued seven-year Treasury bond (T-bond). With a remaining term of six years and three months, the reissued T-bond fetched an average yield of 5.986 percent, lower than the 6.143 percent when it was last reissued on March 11, 2025.

Commercial Banking Corporation chief economist Michael Ricafort said the T-bond's average auction yield eased after the latest inflation fell to 1.8 percent in March, increasing further the odds of a Bangko Sentral ng

Pilipinas (BSP) rate cut.

"The 7-year T-bond auction yield also eased after the recent decline in the comparable 7-year U.S. Treasury yield also to among 3.5-month lows or since December 18, 2024, now at 3.98 percent," Ricafort said.

The auction was 1.8 times oversubscribed with total tenders reaching PHP53.4 billion.

With its decision, the Auction Committee raised the full program of PHP30 billion, bringing the total outstanding volume for the series to PHP413.3 billion.

ADB MAINTAINS PH GROWTH OUTLOOK, LOWERS INFLATION FORECAST FOR 2025

MANILA – The Asian Development Bank (ADB) has retained its 2025 economic growth forecast of 6 percent for gross domestic product (GDP) while lowering its inflation projection.

In its Asian Development Outlook (ADO) April 2025, the ADB kept its GDP forecast from the December 2024 report, which was higher than the 5.6 percent growth recorded in 2024.

However, the growth outlook for 2026 was slightly trimmed to 6.1 percent from 6.2 percent.

"The Philippines remains a bright spot in the Southeast Asian region, with robust private consumption and sustained investments, particularly on infrastructure, continuing to fuel growth," ADB country director for the Philippines Pavit Ramachandran said.

The ADB expects the Philippine economy to be driven by the improvement in employment data, noting that between January 2024 and January 2025, 2.6 million fresh jobs were added to the market.

"Higher household incomes supported by minimum wage hikes in several regions, remittance inflows from Filipinos overseas, as well as election-related spending ahead of the mid-term elections in May will all help bolster domestic consumption," it said.

Government spending is also seen to support economic expansion as public expenditure is expected to increase by 9.7 percent this year.

"A third of the budget will fund social services, including national health insurance, education, skills training and livelihood programs, conditional cash transfers, and food vouchers to low-income families," it added.

The ADB supports social protection efforts, such as the Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program, and is preparing to help finance the Walang Gutom (Zero Hunger) Food Voucher Program.

However, it noted that the GDP forecast has yet to include the potential economic impact of the 17 percent reciprocal tariff imposed by the United States government on April 9.

The ADB outlook on developing Asia, which includes the Philippines, is at 4.9 percent in 2025 and 4.7 percent in 2026.

In the ADB's special analysis on the impact of US tariffs, the effect of reciprocal tariffs in developing Asia is estimated to cut the region's GDP by 0.2 percentage points and another 0.1 percentage point for retaliations, for a total of 0.3 percentage points.

DTI OPEN TO DISCUSS STEELMAKERS' PLEA TO BAN INDUCTION FURNACES

MANILA – The Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) has expressed openness to discussing a proposal from the steelmakers' group to ban the use of induction furnaces in local steel production.

Bureau of Philippine Standards (BPS) Senior Trade Industry Development Specialist John Steven Magboo said although there is no current policy on the prohibition of the use of induction furnaces for steel production, the DTI is "definitely open to discuss regarding that issue and the so-called process of manufacturing the steel parts".

During the Kapihan sa Manila Bay in Malate, Manila on Wednesday, Magboo invited industry stakeholders to submit data supporting their claims that induction furnaces are incapable of producing steel that consistently meets Philippine National Standards (PNS).

He said the BPS issues Philippine Standard (PS) licenses for those who use induction furnaces and electric arc furnaces as long as these products comply with the PNS.

He clarified that the BPS continues to issue Philippine Standard (PS) licenses to manufacturers using both induction and electric arc furnaces, provided their products meet the national standards.

During the same event, Philippine Iron and Steel Institute (PISI) president Ronald Magsajo and Roberto Cola, member of the Department of Science and

Technology-Metals Industry Research and Development Center (MIRDC) Governing Council, reiterated their call for a nationwide ban on induction furnace use in steelmaking.

Cola said countries like China, Japan, and Indonesia have already outlawed this technology due to concerns over steel quality.

"The main drawback of induction furnace facilities is that there is no process of removing the harmful elements in the liquid steel, thus resulting in inconsistent quality of products produced. This results to a safety hazard since these steel products are used in construction of buildings and infrastructure," Cola, who is also a former PISI president, said.

He said that since China began the crackdown on steel manufacturers using induction furnaces, their operations were relocated to ASEAN countries, including the Philippines.

"For the Philippines, induction furnace steelmaking capacity increased from less than 150,000 metric tons per year in 2017 to around 3 million metric tons today. These facilities are the main source of substandard reinforcing steel bars and angle bars in the market," Cola said.

Magsajo echoed these concerns, linking poor-quality steel to recent incidents such as the collapse of the Cabagan-Santa Maria Bridge in Isabela and infrastructure damage caused by earthquakes in Myanmar and Thailand.

He attributed part of the damage to substandard construction materials and engineering flaws.

Magsajo said PISI conducts regular test-buy activities across the country, particularly samples from hardware stores, to monitor if those steel products in the market comply with the industry standards.

He said they can trace the machine used to produce these steel that fell below the industry standards, most of which are using induction furnaces.

Magsajo said that of the around 40 steelmakers in the Philippines, 15 to 20 manufacturers are using induction furnaces. **(PNA) By Kris Crismundo**

DEPED: PH FIRST IN ASIA P ACIFIC TO ADVANCE INCLUSIVE SPECIAL SPORTS

MANILA – The Philippines became the first country in the Asia Pacific region to advance inclusive special sports in schools as the Department of Education (DepEd) partnered with the Special Olympics Pilipinas on Tuesday.

Special Olympics, a global movement, aims to secure the inclusion of individuals with intellectual disabilities through sports.

"We are making history today... We proudly become the first country in the Asia Pacific to join the Special Olympics Global Coalition for Inclusion," DepEd Secretary Sonny Angara said in his speech during the signing of a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the Special Olympics Pilipinas at the Philippine School for the Deaf in Pasay City.

The MOU is in line with the directives of President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr. to ensure quality and inclusive education among Filipinos in the country.

Angara said the initiative will help introduce the new culture of "unified sports" among learners with intellectual disabilities and those without; and help prevent challenges like aggression, bullying, and discrimination.

"Here, learners, of all kinds, can train, play, and grow together. Sa unified sports, magkasamang maglalaro sa regular key sports ang lahat ng learners, wala pong diskriminasyon, walang panghuhusga (all learners will play in regular key sports without discrimination and

judgment)," he said. More than 30,000 learners with intellectual disabilities may benefit from the expected progress moving forward, Angara said.

Special Olympics Pilipinas Chairperson and National President Akiko Thomson-Guevarra lauded the DepEd's move to prioritize the initiative benefiting learners with intellectual disabilities.

"It's our dream in Special Olympics Pilipinas to bring our programs nationwide and with this MOU, we are now finally able to go. The task is both exciting and daunting," she said.

Under the MOU, the Special Olympics Pilipinas will train around 2,000 DepEd teachers and staff in handling special sports; sponsor events fostering the unified sports culture in pilot public schools; and handle the engagement of at least 50,000 learners with and without intellectual disabilities nationwide.

"I am confident and hopeful that we will see the benefits in a very concrete way for all our youth... Studies have shown that benefits are both ways," Thomson-Guevarra said.

She earlier urged participating school division offices (SDOs) to share best practices applied in their earlier participation in "unified sports" for its national implementation.

Schools that implemented unified sports include select areas in Pasay, Las Piñas, and Parañaque; as well as in Sta. Rosa and Biñan in Laguna. **(PNA)**
